

- 24 include members of the Commission and may include individuals invited by the
- 25 Commission or the Behavioral Health Advisory Council to serve on the workgroup.
- 26 [(d)] (E) On or before July 1 each year, beginning in 2024, the workgroups
- established under subsection (a) of this section shall report and make recommendations to
- 28 the Commission and the Behavioral Health Advisory Council.
