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Condominiums and Homeowners Associations – Elections, Financial Statements, and Enforcement

4 FOR the purpose of establishing certain requirements for elections of the governing body 5 of a condominium or homeowners association; requiring the governing body of a 6 condominium to accommodate unit owner organizing activities relating to the 7 governance of the condominium; prohibiting a condominium or homeowners 8 association from charging a unit or lot owner for examining certain records of the 9 condominium or homeowners association in a certain manner; authorizing a 10 condominium or homeowners association to charge a reasonable fee for copying 11 certain documents; expanding the authority of the Division of Consumer Protection 12 of the Office of the Attorney General to enforce certain provisions of law relating to condominiums and homeowners associations; and generally relating 13 condominiums and homeowners associations. 14
