HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

Criminal Law - Witchcraft - Exoneration

FOR the purpose of exonerating those accused, tried, or convicted of witchcraft in the Province of Maryland prior to the American Revolution; and generally relating to the exoneration of historical convictions.

WHEREAS, At least seven individuals were accused of or indicted for the crime of witchcraft, at least two individuals were convicted, and at least one individual was executed in the Province of Maryland prior to the American Revolution; and

WHEREAS, It is now accepted by historians and society as a whole that the accused and convicted individuals were innocent of such accusations and charges, and that their persecution was the result of community strife and panic, combined with overwhelming fear and superstition; and

WHEREAS, Legal procedures and protections differed prior to the adoption of the U.S. Constitution and many historical practices of courts at that time would not meet modern standards of due process and proof, leading to the prosecutions and subsequent miscarriage of justice; and

WHEREAS, The historical status of women was radically different than it is today, and misogyny played a large part in the trial of supposed witches and in denying defendants their rights and dignity; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That individuals formally convicted or executed for practicing witchcraft are exonerated of all crimes relating to charges of witchcraft; and be it further

RESOLVED, That those who were indicted, forced to flee, banished, or acquitted who continued to live with their reputations destroyed and their family names tarnished will

1 have their reputations restored and no longer have disgrace attached to their names, now 2 being in good standing in Maryland; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State of Maryland apologizes to the descendants of those individuals who were indicted, convicted, or executed under the government of the Province of Maryland, and for the harm inflicted on the family and descendants of the persecuted individuals; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State of Maryland acknowledges the trauma and shame that wrongfully continued to affect the families of the accused; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of Legislative Services to the Honorable Wes Moore, Governor of Maryland; the Honorable William C. Ferguson, IV, President of the Senate of Maryland; and the Honorable Adrienne A. Jones, Speaker of the House of Delegates.
