WHEREAS, Researchers at the National Institutes of Health found in 2024 that rates of preteen suicide (ages 8–12) have been increasing by approximately 8% annually

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WHEREAS, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that suicide was the second leading cause of death among individuals between the ages of 10–14 and 25–34, and the third leading cause of death among individuals between 15–24; and

WHEREAS, Research out of the University of Glasgow in 2023 has shown that gambling is linked to a heightened risk of suicide attempts among young adults (ages 16–24) who experienced an increase in severity of gambling problems and were 2.74 times more likely to attempt suicide than those whose gambling was unchanged; and

WHEREAS, The first of Maryland's six casinos opened in 2008 with slot machines, table games for casinos were approved in 2012, and sports betting has been available online and on mobile apps since 2022; and



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WHEREAS, The Maryland Youth Risk Behavior Survey showed that youth gambling is increasing as 17.5% of high school students reported gambling in the last year compared to two years ago when 15.3% reported gambling; and

WHEREAS, The Maryland Center of Excellence on Problem Gambling showed that five of seven Maryland youth focus groups mentioned advertising as one of the biggest reasons people gamble and Maryland youth are exposed to this general advertising on a consistent basis; and

WHEREAS, The Maryland Youth Suicide Prevention School Program must continue to adapt to the growing challenges facing youth suicide, especially with the increased creation of conventional and online gambling in the State; and

WHEREAS, The Blueprint for Maryland's Future works to help combat youth suicide by recognizing student behavioral health issues and students experiencing trauma or violence out of school and includes ways to provide these students with behavioral health services; now, therefore,

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 16 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

## 17 Article – Education

- 19 The General Assembly finds and declares that:
- 20 (1) A statewide Youth Suicide Prevention School Program is essential to 21 address the continuing problem of youth suicide throughout the State;
- 22 (2) The youth suicide problem often exists in combination with other 23 problems, including drug abuse [and], alcohol use, AND GAMBLING ADDICTION;
- 24 (3) A SUICIDE PREVENTION PROGRAM FOR YOUNG PEOPLE MUST 25 RECOGNIZE STUDENT BEHAVIORAL HEALTH ISSUES, RECOGNIZE STUDENTS 26 EXPERIENCING TRAUMA OR VIOLENCE OUT OF SCHOOL, AND REFER STUDENTS TO 27 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES:
- [(3)] (4) A suicide prevention program for young people must emphasize a partnership between educational programs at the State and local levels and community suicide prevention and crisis center agencies;
- It is of vital importance that a statewide Youth Suicide Prevention School Program be established with shared responsibility at both the State and

- 1 county levels, and that this cooperation shall be a major tool in efforts to achieve the 2successful prevention of youth suicide; and 3 County suicide prevention and crisis center agencies along with local education agencies are best suited for developing and implementing programs for 4 5 statewide youth suicide prevention. 6 7-504. 7 The Department shall adopt regulations that set eligibility guidelines for State funding of Youth Suicide Prevention School Programs under this subtitle. 8 9 (2) The regulations shall: 10 Establish procedures for developing local programs, in (i) cooperation with local education agencies, youth service bureaus, and community mental 11 12 health centers; and 13 Establish standards and policies for programs to offer: (ii) 14 1.
