1 AN ACT concerning

2 Commission to Study Health Insurance Pooling – Establishment

- FOR the purpose of establishing the Commission to Study Health Insurance Pooling to
 study the pooling of public employee health insurance purchasing between the State,
 counties, municipal corporations, and county boards of education in the State to
 maximize value and efficiency while maintaining a broad package of benefits and
 reasonable premiums for public employees; and generally relating to the Commission
 to Study Health Insurance Pooling.

- 10 WHEREAS, The State perpetually faces fiscal constraints; and

11 WHEREAS, The State traditionally addresses fiscal constraints by cutting 12 expenditures or raising taxes, fees, and surcharges; and

- WHEREAS, Identifying efficiencies in health insurance purchasing can both save
 money and improve coverage for the State and State employees; and
- 15 WHEREAS, Currently the State, counties, municipal corporations, and county 16 boards of education tend to purchase health insurance without pooling purchasing; and
- WHEREAS, Given the immense expense of health insurance benefits, even a small
 percentage of savings would translate to significant dollar amounts; and

WHEREAS, Being part of a larger health insurance risk pool generally provides 1 $\mathbf{2}$ more cost-effective coverage to members; and 3 WHEREAS, Several states have demonstrated that health insurance pooling for 4 public employees is effective at lowering health insurance costs; and $\mathbf{5}$ WHEREAS, The General Assembly passed House Bill 1400 of 2018 unanimously and 6 the Governor signed it into law, but its provisions have been underutilized; now, therefore, 7 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 8 That: 9 (a) There is a Commission to Study Health Insurance Pooling. 10 (b) The Commission consists of the following members: 11 (1)one member of the Senate of Maryland who serves on the Senate 12Budget and Taxation Committee, appointed by the President of the Senate; 13one member of the House of Delegates who serves on the House (2)Appropriations Committee, appointed by the Speaker of the House; 14(3) 15one member of the House of Delegates who serves on the House Ways 16and Means Committee, appointed by the Speaker of the House; 17(4)the Secretary of Budget and Management, or the Secretary's designee; 18the Comptroller, or the Comptroller's designee; (5)the Maryland Insurance Commissioner, or the Commissioner's 19 (6)20designee; the State Treasurer, or the State Treasurer's designee: 21(7)22the Procurement Advisor to the Board of Public Works, or the (8) Procurement Advisor's designee: 2324(9) (8) one representative of the Maryland Public Purchasing Association, designated by the President of the Maryland Public Purchasing Association; 2526(10) (9) one representative of the Maryland Association of Counties, 27designated by the Executive Director of the Maryland Association of Counties; 28one representative of the Maryland Municipal League, (11) (10) designated by the Chief Executive Officer of the Maryland Municipal League; 29

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1 (12) (11)one representative of the Maryland Association of Boards of $\mathbf{2}$ Education, designated by the President of the Maryland Association of Boards of Education; 3 (13) (12) one representative of the Maryland State Education Association, designated by the President of the Maryland State Education Association; 4 $\mathbf{5}$ (14) (13) one representative of the American Federation of State, County, 6 and Municipal Employees, designated by the President of the American Federation of 7State, County, and Municipal Employees Maryland Council 3; 8 (15) (14) one representative of the Service Employees International Union, designated by the President of the Service Employees International Union 9 10 Maryland/D.C. Division; one representative of the American Federation of Labor and 11 (16) (15) 12Congress of Industrial Organizations, designated by the President of the Maryland State 13and D.C. American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations; 14one representative of the American Federation of Teachers, (17) (16) designated by the President of the American Federation of Teachers–Maryland; and 1516 the following members, appointed by the Governor: (18) (17) 17 (i) four additional representatives of labor unions in the State, including unions representing law enforcement and firefighters; 1819 one individual who is an insurance agent in the State; and (ii) 20four individuals with interest or experience in health care (iii) 21advocacy or fiscal responsibility and efficiency in the State, who may be representatives of 22advocacy organizations or research institutes. 23The Secretary of Budget and Management shall serve as the chair of the (c) Commission. 2425(d) The Department of Budget and Management shall provide staff for the 26Commission. A member of the Commission: 27(e) 28(1)may not receive compensation as a member of the Commission; but 29(2)is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State 30 Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget. 31(f) The Commission may contract with external organizations to provide data 32 analysis necessary to fulfill the Commission's duties under subsection (g).

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(g) The Commission shall:

2 (1) study pooling public employee health insurance purchasing between 3 the State, counties, municipal corporations, and county boards of education using data 4 collected by the Department of Budget and Management, including information provided 5 by the Maryland Association of Counties, the Maryland Municipal League, and the 6 Maryland Association of Boards of Education regarding health insurance benefits offered 7 to public employees by the constituent entities;

8 (2) based on the data collected under item (1) of this subsection, analyze 9 the impacts of pooling public employee health insurance purchasing between the State, 10 counties, municipal corporations, and county boards of education on the State, including 11 the fiscal impacts, and identify any barriers to achieving the successful implementation of 12 pooling public employee health insurance purchasing in the State; and

13 (3) make legislative or regulatory recommendations regarding pooling 14 public employee health insurance purchasing between the State, counties, municipal 15 corporations, and county boards of education in the State to maximize value and efficiency 16 while maintaining a broad package of benefits and reasonable premiums for public 17 employees.

18 (h) On or before December 1, 2026, the Commission shall report its findings and 19 recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1257 of the State 20 Government Article, the General Assembly.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2025. It shall remain effective for a period of 2 years and, at the end of June 30, 2027, this Act, with no further action required by the General Assembly, shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
