10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)

Federated Charities is a nonprofit center, dedicated to collaborative efforts of nonprofits. We provide essential resources, including reduced-cost office space tailored to enhance the operational capabilities of organizations. In addition to space, we offer professional development, technical assistance, and fiscal sponsorship. These programs are crucial for fostering growth and sustainability among smaller organizations that may lack the infrastructure or expertise needed to thrive independently. We have owned the property since 1930. Our buildings feature unique architectural elements that contribute to its visibility and significance, which enhances the aesthetic appeal of the area and serves as a landmark for community engagement. As a cultural hub, we actively support public art and interpretive materials in and on our publicly accessible property.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

We have identified five priority projects for our property based on formal assessments. These include two Aesthetic and Accessibility projects: the front portico entrance and the fountain; two Life and Safety projects: security upgrades and HVAC replacement; and one Use Improvement project: incubator build-out. All these projects are essential as our centers activities evolve to address the needs of an evolving nonprofit sector.

28. Comments

The Federated Charities Nonprofit Center owns two adjacent buildings, the original (circa 1820) was acquired through a bequest in 1930. The adjacent building (circa 1870/1890) was acquired through purchase in the late 1990s and both parts of the the property were combined in 2000, with complete systems updates (sprinklers, elevator, electric, ADA access and other structural systems), either upgraded or added at that time. One of the 5 projects proposed under the LBI is the full renovation of one of the floors to provide more flexible access by community nonprofits. Our center is notable for the amount of shared space it contains, which provides for meeting areas and other common space that is used by all our tenants. The single floor renovation project will not add square footage to the property and we will not be exceeding our existing footprint for the property. The building (partial interior and full exterior) is under MHT easement as well as within the local Historic Preservation Commission in Frederick.

As a nonprofit center, our service recipients are the 501c3 nonprofit organization who themselves provide direct services. Unlike many other nonprofit centers in the U.S., Federated Charities is not a single service provider center (ie. solely focused on housing), we cultivate a range of tenants who provide services across a wide range of sector opportunities. Our partners provide job and employment services, housing, medical/dental, legal and mental health in addition to fostering arts education, land and cultural preservation and general human services. The collaboration inside our (multiple) walls means that our tenants can often directly serve or refer to another organization inside our center. Federated Charities exists in the heart of our city and in many cases sees significant numbers of individuals who simply drop in when they are struggling with something that would normally be dealt with by a human services provider. The significance of this becomes relevant when some other agency onsite can either provide what they need or are already working with another organization who can offer assistance, often immediately. Collectively for our nonprofit partners, co-housing their offices and some of their additional back end costs means significant savings in annual resources, funds that can be used to enhance and expand their own direct services. Over just the past 9 years, that has meant more than \$2.25M remains as program dollars in organizations rather than spent on overhead costs.

In 2024, we welcomed 2,546 visitors to our client nonprofit agencies. This is in addition to people who visited during the annual garden tour, the winter ice festival, the fall street festival or during other public events. Federated Charities is not only a hub for community services, it is a hub for community.
