Senate Bill 727 (Charles County Senators)

Education, Energy, and the Environment

Charles County – Student Bus Transportation Providers – Provider Displacement

This bill limits the ability of the Charles County Public School System to change the method of providing student transportation services by requiring the county board of education to provide at least a 10-year notice to student transportation providers. **The bill takes effect July 1, 2025.**

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None.

Local Effect: Charles County school expenditures may increase in future years, potentially by a significant amount, to the extent that the bill's prohibition on the displacement of individuals providing school bus transportation services results in higher rates and corresponding costs by private contractors. Local school revenues are not affected, since the bill does not alter State funding or the county appropriation to the local school system. **This bill imposes a mandate on a unit of local government.**

Small Business Effect: Minimal.

Analysis

Bill Summary: Before taking any action that results in the displacement of a person that has been providing student bus transportation services in the county, the Charles County Board of Education must (1) provide notice of the intent to displace the person at least 10 years in advance; and (2) hold at least one public hearing on the advisability of the county board providing student bus transportation services at least 5 years in advance. The

county board must provide notice of any hearing required by the bill in a newspaper of general circulation in the county once each week for two successive weeks before the hearing.

Under the bill, "displacement" means the provision of student bus transportation services by the county board of education that precludes a private person that has been providing the services and is licensed and certified to provide the services from continuing to provide the services. Under the bill, "displacement" does not include circumstances in which the county board does not renew a contract for student bus transportation services, and at the end of the contract term, contracts with another person to provide the services. "Displacement" also does not include circumstances in which the person that has been providing the services (1) has acted in a manner threatening to public health or safety; (2) has committed a material breach of a contract for student bus transportation services; or (3) refuses to continue to provide student bus transportation services under the terms and conditions of an existing agreement.

Current Law: Student transportation services in Maryland are generally provided by a combination of government-owned school vehicles and private contractors. In Charles County, the local school system primarily uses private contractors to transport students. Contractors operating the buses are not considered school system employees.

County Appropriation to the Local School System

Each year, the county government is required to appropriate funds to the county board of education equivalent to the greater of the Maintenance of Effort (MOE) requirement or the local share amount of all wealth-equalized formulas. The per-pupil MOE amount is based upon the enrollment count. The local share amount equals the local share of the foundation formula, compensatory education, English learner, special education, comparable wage index, full-day prekindergarten, college and career ready, transitional supplemental instruction (through fiscal 2026), and career ladder grant programs.

The Charles County government appropriation to the local school system totaled \$218.8 million in fiscal 2024 and \$232.0 million in fiscal 2025. Provisions of this bill will not affect the required level of county government funding to the local school system.

Local Expenditures: Student transportation services in Charles County total approximately \$47.1 million in fiscal 2025, representing 9.3% of the general fund operating costs for the local school system. The projected annual increase for student transportation

services (7.8%) exceeded the overall projected increase for the school system's total general fund (5.3%). This illustrates that the cost of providing student transportation services in the county is exceeding the growth rate in other categories, including classroom instructional costs (4.6% for instruction salaries and 3.1% for instruction supplies).

Based on a 2015 study on the school system's student transportation services, the Charles County Public School System indicates that transportation costs could be lowered on average by 3.3% a year by bringing student bus services in-house rather than utilizing private contractors. Based on the school system's fiscal 2025 budget, the potential cost savings to the local school system could total over \$1.5 million annually.

The 10-year advance notice requirement within the bill may preclude the local school system from bringing student transportation services in-house. As a result, the local school system may not be able to realize potential cost savings. The exact scale of the potential impact is unknown, but for context, the proposed <u>fiscal 2026 school budget</u> indicates that the local school system's current bus fleet consists of 384 total buses, including 315 contractual buses and 69 buses owned by the school system (33 regular, 17 special needs, 19 spare).
