2 **Criminal Procedure – Expungement – No Finding and Case Terminated Without**
3 **Finding**

4 FOR the purpose of authorizing the expungement of a disposition under a certain provision
5 of law if the disposition was included in a case that was disposed of by the court with
6 a no finding designation or designated by the court as having been terminated
7 without finding; and generally relating to expungement.

23 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,

2 (a) A person may file a petition listing relevant facts for expungement of a police
3 record, court record, or other record maintained by the State or a political subdivision of
4 the State if the person is convicted of:

5 (1) a misdemeanor that is a violation of:

6 (i) § 6–320 of the Alcoholic Beverages and Cannabis Article;

7 (ii) an offense listed in § 17–613(a) of the Business Occupations and
8 Professions Article;

11 (iv) § 3–1508 or § 10–402 of the Courts Article;

26 (iii) § 6–202(a), § 6–203, or § 6–204 of the Criminal Law Article; or

27 (3) an attempt, a conspiracy, or a solicitation of any offense listed in item

28 (1) or (2) of this subsection.

1 (d) (1) If the person is convicted of a new crime during the applicable time
2 period set forth in subsection (c) of this section, the original conviction or convictions are
3 not eligible for expungement unless the new conviction becomes eligible for expungement.

4 (2) A person is not eligible for expungement if the person is a defendant in
5 a pending criminal proceeding.

6 (3) **[If] SUBJECT TO SUBSECTION (J) OF THIS SECTION, IF** a person is
7 not eligible for expungement of one conviction in a unit, the person is not eligible for
8 expungement of any other conviction in the unit.

9 **(J) A DISPOSITION MAY BE EXPUNGED UNDER THIS SECTION IF THE CASE**
10 **WAS NOT DISPOSED OF BY AN UNEQUIVOCAL CONVICTION BUT WAS INSTEAD**
11 **INCLUDED IN A CASE THAT WAS:**

12 **(1) DISPOSED OF BY THE COURT WITH A NO FINDING DESIGNATION;**
13 **OR**

14 **(2) DESIGNATED BY THE COURT AS HAVING BEEN TERMINATED**
15 **WITHOUT FINDING.**

16 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
17 October 1, 2026.
