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## CHAPTER \_\_\_\_\_

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Public Health Reform Act**

3 FOR the purpose of requiring the Maryland Department of Health to organize the  
4 Maryland Medical Reserve Corps; requiring the Maryland Department of Health to  
5 notify each health officer for a county of a certain procurement to offer the  
6 opportunity for the county health department to join the procurement; ~~authorizing~~  
7 ~~a health officer for a county to make an appointment to a position without the~~  
8 ~~approval of the Maryland Department of Health or the Department of Budget and~~  
9 ~~Management if the position is fully funded without State funding;~~ authorizing a  
10 health officer for a county to enter into certain contracts if the Secretary of Health  
11 does not respond to a request for approval within a certain time period; altering the  
12 membership, leadership selection process, and staffing of the Commission on Public  
13 Health; requiring the Commission on Public Health to provide oversight over the  
14 implementation of recommendations made by the Commission on Public Health;  
15 establishing the Public Health Workforce Development Fund; requiring that interest  
16 earnings of the Public Health Workforce Development Fund remain in the Public  
17 Health Workforce Development Fund; authorizing the Maryland Department of  
18 Health and the Health Services Cost Review Commission to transfer money from the  
19 Population Health Improvement Fund to the Public Health Workforce Development  
20 Fund in a manner consistent with a certain agreement; requiring the Department of  
21 Legislative Services to develop a process to assess the health equity impacts of  
22 relevant legislation; altering the membership of the Maryland Corps Program  
23 Advisory Board; requiring the Commission to establish a Community Benefits  
24 Modernization subcommittee; requiring the Maryland Department of Health to  
25 convene a certain workgroup; and generally relating to public health.

25 City Commissioner of Health or the health officer of a county.

17 or special taxing district in the county the rules or regulations that the county board of  
18 health adopts unless the municipality or district has a charter provision or ordinance that:

19   1. Covers the same subject matter as the county rule or  
20 regulation;

21   2. Is at least as restrictive as the county rule or regulation;  
22 and

23   3. Includes provisions for enforcement.

24           (5) A health officer shall perform any investigation or other duty or  
25 function directed by the Secretary or the county board of health and submit appropriate  
26 reports to them.

27           (d) **(1)** Subject to the consent of the governing body of the county and the  
28 written approval of the Secretary, a health officer for a county may enter into a contract or  
29 any other written agreement to assist or participate in the delivery of health care services  
30 with a person that is authorized to provide, finance, coordinate, facilitate, or otherwise  
31 deliver health care services in the State.

32                           **(2) IF THE SECRETARY DOES NOT RESPOND TO A REQUEST FOR**  
33 **WRITTEN APPROVAL WITHIN 7 DAYS AFTER RECEIVING THE REQUEST, THE HEALTH**

4 fiscal year, received from:

16 issued that a search was made but the requested record is not on file; or

17 (iii) If the retention of collections would be inconsistent with

20 of Health shall report annually to the Secretary on the use of collections retained under  
21 paragraph (1) of this subsection.
