House Bill 1327 (Delegate Bhandari)
Government, Labor, and Elections

Key Bridge Heroes Commemoration Day and Memorial Tribute Ceremony

This bill requires the Governor to annually proclaim March 26 as Key Bridge Heroes Commemoration Day. The bill also requires the Governor to honor and remember the Key Bridge Heroes and recognize the heroes’ family members and loved ones in an official State ceremony held in Annapolis on March 26, 2027. **The bill takes effect June 30, 2026.**

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None. Commemorating Key Bridge Heroes Commemoration Day does not affect State finances. The Governor’s Office can implement the bill, including holding an official State ceremony, with existing resources. No effect on revenues.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Bill Summary: As part of the proclamation, the Governor must encourage the media, government units, business and recreational facilities, and citizens of the State to unite in remembrance and commemorate the sacrifices of the following workers who died during the collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge on March 26, 2024: (1) Dorlian Ronial Castillo Cabrera; (2) Alejandro Hernandez Fuentes; (3) Miguel Angel Luna Gonzalez; (4) Carlos Daniel Hernandez; (5) Jose Mynor Lopez; and (6) Maynor Yassir Suazo Sandoval.

Current Law: Twenty official commemorative days, seven months, and one week are recognized in State law, as shown in **Appendix – Official Commemorative Days and Months in Maryland**. The Governor also must issue a proclamation each year encouraging citizens and other individuals to observe a moment of silence at 3:00 p.m. on Memorial Day to unite in remembrance and commemorate the heroic acts and efforts of Marylanders who have served and died in the U.S. Armed Forces.
