Dear Chair McIntosh and Members of the House Appropriations Committee:

The Montgomery County Food Council urges you to **SUPPORT** this bill as it seeks to protect food access and food supplement program eligibility for food-insecure Maryland residents and families, despite any potential changes in federal law that could impact benefits access for these individuals.

Economists at the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities estimate that each dollar that households redeem through the SNAP program expands the economy by \$1.70, provides important support for small businesses, and even increases non-food purchases. Therefore, upholding access to food supplement program benefits through State law will effectively enhance the economic and food security of our communities.

Recent legislation at the federal level has generated fear and confusion among residents concerning their participation in benefits programs upon which they rely, which their tax dollars help to support, and most importantly, for which they are legally eligible. It is critical that Maryland passes this bill to protect Marylanders against the potentially negative impacts of federal legislation that could increase food insecurity rates, state- and nation-wide. For these reasons, the Montgomery County Food Council supports and urges you to vote **FOR** this bill.
