RE: House Bill 1568 – Labor and Employment - Health Care Facilities -

Workplace Safety (Safe Care Act)

POSITION: SUPPORT

Chair Pendergrass, Vice Chair Pena-Melnyk, and Members of the Committee, please be advised that the Baltimore City Administration (BCA) **supports** House Bill 1568.

HB 1568 would require state healthcare facilities to establish workplace safety plans. It demands greater accountability from healthcare facilities to protect its staff. This bill provides an important opportunity to create meaningful tools to evaluate, address, and prevent workplace violence for Maryland healthcare workers.

Across the nation, doctors, nurses, and other health care workers often face significant risk of workplace violence. From 2002 to 2013, the rate of serious workplace violence in healthcare was more than four times greater than that of any other private industry. In a poll by the American College of Emergency Physicians, 60% of emergency physician respondents reported a physical assault within the prior year. In fact, the evidence suggests that incidents of workplace violence may be underreported.
