Support SB 28: Solid Waste Management - Prohibition on Release of a Balloon Into the Atmosphere

What SB 28 will do:

- Ban intentional releases of balloons into the atmosphere and the organization of balloon releases
- Establish civil penalties not to exceed \$250.00 for each violation
- Department of the Environment is responsible for enforcement but may delegate enforcement authority to units of counties, cities or other local governments
- Requires reporting of violations to MDE

Why legislation to ban intentional balloon releases is needed:

- To protect our wildlife -
 - o Research suggests that balloons are the number 1 marine debris risk of mortality for seabirds
 - The Sea Turtle Foundation estimated in 2011 that 100,000 marine mammals and turtles and 1 million seabirds die every year from ingesting or becoming entangled in marine debris, including indigestible plastic that blocks stomachs.
 - Last May, an Assateaque pony was found with a balloon ribbon dangling from her mouth; but fortunately did not die
- To protect our waterways and environment
 - o Balloon waste from releases often end up in farms and waterways, harming the environment
 - o Foil and latex take years to decay, if at all

What SB 28 does not ban:

- Unintentional or negligent releases
- Balloons used in research at institutions of higher education
- Balloons released by the State or under contract to the State
- A hot air balloon recovered after launch
