ANDREW FREEMAN GENERAL COUNSEL The ACLU of Maryland urges a favorable report on SB 33, which provides prepaid postage for the return of absentee ballots.

The vote is the defining act of citizenship. As a democracy, we should encourage all eligible voters to avail themselves of the franchise. In doing so, we should make the act of voting itself available to all eligible voters. The expansion of absentee ballot voting moves Maryland toward this goal.

The ACLU of Maryland supports enabling more people to access the franchise. Absentee voting has been an important resource for many Marylanders—in November 2012 more than 150,000 people¹ voted via absentee ballot. In 2016, that number rose to 175,374.2

Each election cycle presents a different set of parameters for ballot creation and for the size and weight of the return mail piece. As a result, many voters do not know the correct amount of postage required to return their ballots by mail. SB 33 solves this problem by providing the return postage for the voter.

For people incarcerated, struggling to get by, working multiple jobs, and trying to put food on the table for their families, finding time and money to buy postage can decrease these individuals' likelihood to vote.

For the foregoing reasons, the ACLU of Maryland supports SB 33.
