As a para-pro I watched effective measures of self-directed therapy launch once wounded men -- full of excuses -- into the realm of responsibility, accountability, ownership, sobriety & selflessness.

Passing SB767 will give all the right people a second chance, enhance my confidence & restore confidence of the community in the interdependence of government, citizens of conscience & guardians of morality, to all be credible messengers; actualizing success principles of life-promoting investments in redeemable people.

Corrections is about Law & order **and** clinical care. Higher Education is the clinical remedy for justice impacted people.

For the reason stated above I strongly urge this committee to make higher education -- without barrier -- for current & formerly incarcerated people a priority by voting favorably on SB767: Higher Education - Admissions Process - Criminal History;
