#### What will HB1540 do?

- Provide uniform regulatory standards for mold assessment and remediation
- Strengthen tenant's rights
  - o Landlords will be required to disclose mold hazards in rental properties
  - o Creates a remedy in local District Court
- Require annual indoor air quality reporting and mold inspections

# Why is this legislation important?

Maryland has NO laws to protect citizens from the harmful effects of mold exposure

#### This legislation helps to:

- Establish best practices to eliminate mold hazards in accordance with EPA standards
- Improve indoor air quality
- Decrease school absences due to respiratory issues
- Reduce Medicaid expenditures for ER visits
- Increase business for licensed contractors



HB1540 provides protection for schools, childcare centers, rental dwellings, nursing homes, and assisted living facilities for the elderly affected by mold

### The Facts

- Mold can grow on any surface (shower curtains, towels, floors, walls) in damp areas (bathrooms, basements)
- Mold exposure can result in chronic lung disease, asthma, as well as eye and throat irritation
- Mold disproportionally affects low-income communities
- Reducing asthma triggers such as mold in the form of energy efficiency interventions can result in energy savings for families
