TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 875

Hospitals – Financial Assistance Policies and Bill Collections

Senate Finance Committee March 5, 2020

Marylanders Against Poverty (MAP) strongly supports SB 875, which increases hospital financial assistance to cover families at 200% of the federal poverty line – ensuring that members of such families will receive medically necessary care regardless of their inability to pay – and requires that a payment plan is available to uninsured patients with family incomes between 200% and 500% of the federal poverty level.

Many poor and working Marylanders cannot afford the rising cost of health care as the incomes of working people stagnate compared to medical inflation. A recent report found that a third of Americans postponed medical care due to costs – the vast majority of whom delayed treatment for a serious health condition.¹ Unsurprisingly, such delays were most common among lower-income households.² Beyond the financial costs borne by individuals, there are significant societal costs as a result of delayed medical treatment.³ Even after passage of the Affordable Care Act, medical bills frequently cause financial hardship and even destitution.^{4,5} One need look no further than GoFundMe, which proclaims itself to be "the leader in online medical fundraising" with over 250,000 campaigns a year – including in Maryland.⁶

SB 875 would reduce the financial barriers to needed health care, increasing the threshold from 150% to 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) under which Financial Assistance Policies provide free medically necessary care to patients, and requiring hospitals to provide payment plans to patients with incomes between 200% and 500% of the FPL. The bill would also ensure that hospitals screen for Financial Assistance Policy eligibility, and provide clear and accessible written and verbal notice of such hospital policies.

MAP appreciates your consideration, and strongly urges a favorable report on SB 875.
