HB703: Maryland Commission on Civil Rights—Employment Discrimination—Reporting HEARING 25 FEBRUARY 2020

The Commission on Civil Rights already produces the *Annual Report Statistics* that outlines general statistics on discrimination by type, region, and sector (Employment, Housing, or Public Accommodation). The report in its current edition does not include specific accounts of national origin discrimination including the country of origin or the employment sector (type of job and public/private). HB703 requires selected Maryland counties to record and provide the type of discrimination, job category, public/private sector, and country of origin of the complainant.

• Why is this additional reporting necessary/What are the gaps in the current report?

The current report offers general statistics about discrimination but does not offer comprehensive anecdotal evidence on the claims. Of the 1450 total claims cited in the report, only 6 are represented in detail. The 6 cases do not accurately depict the issues victims face. There is a significant lack of facts presented for each instance.

Why were only these counties selected?

The 6 counties represent a socially, ethnically, and affluently diverse picture of Maryland citizens. Each has a significant portion of foreign born citizens and this sample best applies the resources of the state. These 6 counties represent 828,000 of the estimated 895,000 foreign born Maryland residents.

14.8% of Maryland residents are foreign born (895,000). The national average is 13.7%
