RE: Attorney General's Support for SB212 (SUPPORT)

The Attorney General urges the Judicial Proceedings Committee to report favorably on Senate Bill 212. Senate Bill 212 makes strangulation and suffocation a modality of first degree assault. Currently, first degree assault is committed either when a person commits an assault with a firearm or when a person intentionally causes or attempts to cause serious physical injury to another. Senate Bill 212 would add a third modality of first degree assault—committing an assault by intentionally suffocating or strangling another.

Prosecuting strangulation under the “serious physical injury” modality of first degree assault is notoriously difficult because only half of strangulation victims have external injuries, and only 15% have injuries capable of being photographed.¹ This includes strangulation cases that result in death.² But strangulation is one of the most significant lethality indicators in domestic violence situations; women who have suffered a previous strangulation by an intimate partner are 750% more likely to be killed by that partner than women who have never been strangled.³

The vast majority of states specifically address suffocation and/or strangulation in their criminal codes.⁴ Enacting Senate Bill 212 will protect victims of domestic violence and bring Maryland in line with nearly all of our sister states. The Office of the Attorney General urges the Judiciary Committee to report favorably on House Bill 212.
