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## **TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF HB 36**

Juvenile Proceedings - Fines, Fees, and Costs

House Judiciary Committee
January 16, 2020

House Bill 36 prohibits the court in a juvenile proceeding to impose civil fines or court costs, including those after delinquency is found, assess attorney's fees for the services of a public defender or other attorney appointed by the court to represent the child, or order payment from a parent to support a child.

Juvenile defendants and their parents may be indigent when using the services of a public defender or other court-appointed attorney during a juvenile proceeding. Levying additional fees on youths and their families during an already trying time is unjust. Youth who are unable to pay such costs and fees may face increased incarceration or probation for their inability to pay timely, and their parents can be sent to debt collectors and go into serious debt trying to pay them for their children. These costs and fees serve no rehabilitative purpose for the youth, and in practice have disproportionately affected children of color, a population already marginalized and overburdened by the court system. No parent should have to decide between paying for basic necessities, such as groceries, education, and housing, and paying arbitrary court costs and fees that will not help rehabilitate their child or keep further recidivism rates down.

Maryland Alliance for the Poor (MAP) supports legislation that reduces the financial burden on Marylanders living around or below the poverty line and those suffering from the negative effects of poverty. Situations such as those addressed by this bill only serve to add to the hardships of youths and their families already struggling financially, especially when no purpose exists to help rehabilitate the child or ease already burdened families.

MAP appreciates your consideration and respectfully requests a favorable report on House Bill 36.
