Subject: HB278 – Misconduct in Office

The Legislative Committee of the Criminal Law & Practice Section of the Maryland State Bar Association (MSBA) Supports HB278 - Misconduct in Office.

This bill codifies the common law crime of misconduct in office when someone has committed two or more acts that would constitute the traditional crime of misconduct in office in its various permutations - malfeasance, misfeasance or non-feasance. More importantly, it removes the current two-year statute of limitations.

Misconduct in office is a serious problem. It represents a fundamental breach of trust and undermines public confidence. Unfortunately, misconduct is often not discovered until after the statute of limitations has run, which make it impossible to prosecute. This bill would fix that problem.

By requiring that there be two or more acts of misconduct, the bill ensures that only crimes of a continuing nature will be prosecuted under its provision; otherwise the current two-year statute of limitations applies.

For the reasons stated, we Supports HB278 - Misconduct in Office.
