However, fast forward 20 years we now see programs like Law and Order, The Closer, and COPS that depicts law enforcement and states attorneys as less than friendly. Their motivation is convictions and guilty until proven innocent. And let's not forget social media that captures law enforcement by a few bad apples, as a rotten bunch. HB624 is puts officer friendly, and McGruff back in the Interrogation room because there are advocates and attorneys that are there for OUR children.

After a long debate with a former states attorney who didn't feel that Maryland had a problem with how juveniles are treated by law enforcement, he had to admit one thing. Having someone in the room that the child knew was there on their behalf would be comforting for the child. This bill is about the balance of getting the truth and caring for OUR child.

Likewise, BRIDGE Maryland, Inc. also offers this moral imperative from member faith institutions.
