House Bill 222 – Capital Gains 1% Surcharge

Hello everyone. My name is Dolly Kildee and I stand here today as a proud member and leader of SEIU Local 500. Local 500 represents over 20,000 working people in Maryland, Washington D.C., and Virginia.

Our union is made up of support staff at the Montgomery County Public School system, Family Child Care Providers, Adjunct Faculty at several Maryland colleges and universities, staff at non-profits and many other working people across the region.

Thousands of our members and I work or have worked as educators. Collectively, we have spent years teaching and caring for the future generations of our state.

It's the reason I'm here today to support House Bill 222, which would right an historic wrong in our tax code by taking in revenue from capital gains - the money that investors take home from their investments.

Each of us gathered here today needs to pay taxes on our earned income. Whether a teacher, a paraeducator, or a State Delegate, we are all responsible to pay a fair share of our income toward our society. Nowhere is this revenue used with greater urgency and importance than when it is put toward our children's education.

The wrong that we ask the General Assembly to right this session is simple and straightforward. We ask that they have wealthy investors pay a fair share of their passive income toward our children's education - just like the rest of us pay a share of our hard-earned money.
