### Ways & Means Committee HB 675: Education – Public Schools – Seizure Action Plans (Brynleigh Act) February 21, 2020 Position: <u>Support</u>

The Maryland Developmental Disabilities Council (DD Council) is an independent, public policy organization that works to improve policies, programs and services that support people with developmental disabilities and their families in our communities. The DD Council is led by people with developmental disabilities and their families. From that perspective, the DD Council supports HB 675 which requires schools to make action plans, train staff and engage in training to ensure a safe and enriching environment for students with epilepsy and seizure disorders.

#### WHY is this legislation important?

- > There are 7,900 children living with epilepsy in Maryland.<sup>i</sup> That is 913 students per school nurse.<sup>ii</sup>
- Education, information, and training ensures all school personnel are not only prepared but can recognize and respond appropriately and efficiently to the student experiencing a seizure-creating a safer environment for every student in Maryland's public schools.

#### WHAT does this legislation do?

Brings awareness to the entire educational community so students living with epilepsy or a seizure disorder can feel safe in school and reach their full potential by requiring:

- Beginning in the 2021-22 school year, 2 school employees be trained in recognizing the signs and symptoms of a seizure, administering first aid, administering seizure medication, and performing nerve stimulation. Additionally, this bill provides for the presence of a registered nurse to fulfill the training requirements for a school.
- Annual training to school personnel with direct contact and supervision of students on recognizing the signs and symptoms of a seizure.
- Parents of a student diagnosed with a seizure disorder to collaborate with school personnel to create a seizure action plan. That plan will be kept in the office and distributed to staff and volunteers with direct student contact.
- Schools to provide an age–appropriate seizure education program to all students consistent with guidelines published by the Epilepsy Foundation of America.

# The proactive approach to support that HB 675 provides is essential so that students who may experience seizures disorder maintain their independence and meaningfully participate in all aspects of school life.
