Re: ESA Position on HB 1262 - Support with Amendment

On behalf of the Electronic Security Association, I wish to submit our support for HB 1262, with amendments. While we support the effort for statewide electrical licensing in Maryland, this bill leaves low-voltage (limited energy) integrators with uncertainty, ambiguity, and the potential for significant disruption of a growing and thriving industry. We will support this bill with an amendment that provides a simple definition for "low-voltage electrician".

Without defining what "low-voltage" is, it will be impossible for authorities having jurisdiction (AHJ) or low-voltage integrators themselves to know whether they are exempt under this licensing framework. In addition, the opportunity for wildly inconsistent, unfair and incongruent interpretations among regulators and AHJs would be virtually certain.

We respectfully submit our support for this legislation that includes the following definition for "limited energy integrators" which we believe should be the proper term used for "low-voltage electrician".

"Limited energy integrator" means an individual who has the experience, knowledge, and skill to provide limited energy services on the load side of a transformer, which is connected directly by a licensed electrician or by plugging into an existing receptacle. Voltage is not to exceed 100 VAC or VDC unless listed to prevent hazards to life and property. Installation in a manner that complies with applicable plans, specifications, codes, or laws.
