Common Cause Maryland supports SB 37, which will empower citizens by enhancing their ability to directly participate in the petition process guaranteed under the Maryland Constitution.

The petition process is an important part of Maryland's democratic government; it gives citizens the chance to have their voice heard and to bring legislative action they disagree with to the voters to decide. It is a process that deserves greater accessibility but continues to be a restrictive.

The process of petitioning largely involves direct contact with Maryland voters. The methods of reaching voters typically involve canvassing at high traffic locations like metro stops and farmers markets or going door-to-door. And while petitions can be posted online, it requires proper formatting which typically comes in the form of a pdf, limiting overall usability for most voters.

This existing process creates unnecessary hurdles to an already limited tool as most voters have limited availability to interact in-person with petitioners for reasons ranging from work schedules to access to public transportation. This proves even more difficult for the voters who are confined to their place of residence.

SB 37 seeks to address this by codifying the temporary regulations adopted by the State Board of Elections (SBE) during the 2020 elections in response to COVID-19, allowing for electronic petition signatures. This temporary change which has been extended by SBE utilize the technology available to us, creating greater access to all citizens throughout the state and making the process of verifying signatures seamless for election officials.

Citizens often times feel like power is out of their hands. SB 37 is a step forward in that it helps reduce barriers that usually hinder direct participation in the petition process by voters. Public engagement in the democratic process should be encouraged, whether citizens are voting for elected officials or bringing issues to the ballot.

We urge a favorable report.

Dear Chair Pinsky, Vice-Chair Kagan and Members of the Committee:

In essence, the proclamation of a State of Emergency by the Governor on March 5, 2020 stopped in-person signature collection on petitions. We appreciate and support the decision by the State Board of Elections (SBE) to expeditiously institute a policy, just six weeks later, to permit the gathering of electronic signatures on April 22, 2020. At a time of crisis and upheaval in so many other aspects of our lives, the SBE policy provided a quick alternate avenue for citizens to continue to exercise their legal rights to collect petition signatures.

Set to expire on August 3, 2020, the last day to submit petitions to place a question or a candidate on the November 2020 ballot, the policy has been repeatedly extended by the SBE, first to the January 13, 2021 and most recently to May 27, 2021, resulting in very little disruption to petitioners gathering signatures towards the 2022 election. To our understanding, Maryland stands with only a handful of other states in having taken these steps during the COVID-19 crisis. It speaks to our state's commitment to uphold voting rights in every way possible.

What we have found is that electronic petitions have increased the accessibility of citizens to become aware of the existence of petitions and to sign them without having to run into a volunteer holding a clipboard. The cleaner set of signatures verified through the voter database are both administratively easier to certify and easier for petitioners to maintain a count of clean signatures. However, electronic signatures did not make signature collection a trivial exercise. Of the three citizen-driven petitions we became aware of, only one succeeded in collecting sufficient signatures to place the question on the 2020 ballot.

The current crisis has shown us many new ways to communicate and carry out business. We ask for a favorable report on SB 37 to codify yet another democracy good that has emerged from this crisis.

Get Money Out (GMOM) is an all-volunteer organization established eight years ago. We want all citizens to have equal access to the ballot and an equal say in governance. Through our grassroots actions, we have signed up over 9,000 supporters.

We support Senate Bill 37, which aims to assure the security of petitions submitted to the Board of Elections. In response to the pandemic the State Board of Elections has already taken measures to allow electronic signatures to be submitted on petitions, but their action was temporary. As with many provisions adopted for the pandemic, the public will expect continued use of electronic communications in order to improve access to the political process for citizens. This bill will codify and improve the security of that process on a continuing basis. The bill contains provisions to assure that signatures are valid and that those collecting petitions take reasonable measures to protect the data prior to its being submitted to the Board of Elections. The language has been carefully vetted to optimize improved access for the public, verifiability, and security. We urge a favorable report.

#### Policy Resolutions

##### In Support Of:

- The expulsion of Delegate Mary Ann Lisanti. Lisanti referred to District 25 as a “nigger district” in the company of several state legislators. She was censured for this act in February 2019 but has refused to resign.
- The renaming of the House Office Building to honor Congressman Elijah Cummings. Former Chair of the Legislative Black Caucus of Maryland, first Black legislator to be named Speaker Pro Tempore, Congressman from Maryland’s 7th Congressional District from 1996-2019, Chair of the Oversight & Reform Committee during the Trump presidency, and leading figure in Trump’s impeachment by the House of Representatives.
- Banning the Maryland state government and local governments from the sale or purchase of items produced by prison labor unless paid prevailing wages.
- The Housing Justice package (HB52; HB18/SB154; HB104/SB401). Sponsored by Delegates Vaughn Stewart, Jheanelle K. Wilkins, Melissa Wells, Wanika Fisher and Senators Jill P. Carter, Will Smith, Charles Sydnor, & Shelly Hettleman.
- The Tax Fairness package (HB215; HB262; HB319; HB201). Sponsored by Delegate Julie Palakovich Carr to make Maryland’s local property taxes & capital gains taxes are assessed in a progressive manner that lowers the burden for working families and ends tax loopholes in “opportunity zones” & carried interest.

- **HB89/SB397.** Sponsored by Delegate Jheanelle K. Wilkins & Senator Jill P. Carter, to shorter incarceration sentences with academic options.
- **HB222/SB224.** Sponsored by Delegate Jheanelle K. Wilkins & Senator Chris West, to ensure that incarcerated individuals are aware of their voting rights and are given the opportunity to vote.
- **HB155/SB98.** Sponsored by Delegate Jheanelle K. Wilkins & Senator Cory McCray, to ban discrimination in pre-k programs and schools.
- **HB41.** Sponsored by Delegate Stephanie Smith, to establish a state banking taskforce.
- **HB320.** Sponsored by Delegate Stephanie Smith, to ease the transfer of credits.
- Legislation to shield eviction proceedings from the general public and protect the credit and financial history of tenants. Sponsored by Delegate Nicole Williams.

#### Favorable With Amendments

- **HB238.** Sponsored by Delegate Melissa Wells, to automatically expunge certain crimes after a certain period of time, expanding job opportunities for returning citizens.  
Amendment, introduced by Janna Parker:  
“Crimes that have been expunged or not found guilty for, should be retroactively removed from the Maryland CaseSearch database.”
- **HB269.** Sponsored by Delegate Melissa Wells, to create urban agriculture grants.  
Amendment, introduced by Richard DeShay Elliott:  
“Prince George’s County will be included in the implementation of this bill, following upcoming rezoning”

#### In Opposition Of:

- The nomination of Bryon Bereano to the Circuit Court. Prince George's County voters did not nominate him to the Court in the 2020 elections. His Senate confirmation should be denied.

By allowing the collection of electronic signatures for petitions we can ensure our State Board of Election and our Democratic Process is keeping with the times as well as make it easier for voters to be informed and involved in our elections.

To put it simply allowing voters the ability to sign petitions electronically makes our system more accessible, more Democratic, and in step with the world we live in today based around technology. It is for these reasons the Lower Shore Progressive Caucus supports this bill and recommends a **FAVORABLE** report in committee.
