Dear Honorable members of the Environment and Transportation Committee,

I am writing on behalf of Patuxent Riverkeeper, Clean Air Prince George's, and Heron There Farm to urge you to vote against HB980. We concerned this bill, if enacted, will badly erode public trust in government and will also undermine the Prince George's County's ability to ensure that our lands are zoned and used in ways that are protective of the public health, the environment, and natural resources. Zoning has a vital role to play in many different factors that involve the County's wellbeing—including the future of public transportation, air quality, protection of waterways, preservation of agricultural areas and forests. The way that land is used will have an enormous impact on the County's ability to reduce its carbon footprint at time of accelerating climate crisis--woodlands are a big plus—large developments in rural areas add motor vehicle miles and strip away trees.

Passage of HB980 is a signal that developers and special interests will give the green light to "up-zone" properties by contributing to County Council members who have failed to disclose such contributions. The purpose of zoning is prevent, not to encourage, piecemeal land use by those who have financial wherewithal and legal ability to do so.

The bill, by allowing applicants to add their amendments as part of the County's Zoning Map approval forecloses the normal opportunity that the public has to obtain information and provide input in a timely fashion—including advance notice, access to detailed information, and public hearings.

We therefore join with dozens of organizations and citizen to urge the General Assembly members to say No to HB980.
