Services (Self-Direction Act)

<u>The MLLC supports HB318 Developmental Disabilities Administration - Self-Directed Services (Self-Direction Act).</u>

The MLLC is a bipartisan group of Senators and Delegates committed to supporting legislation that improves the lives of Latinos throughout our state. The MLLC is a crucial voice in the development of public policy that uplifts the Latino community and benefits the state of Maryland. Thank you for allowing us the opportunity to express our support of HB318.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) <u>Disability and Health Data System</u>, more than 20% of Maryland's population has a disability and nearly 26% are Latinx. It is important that members of the disability community are listened to and provided the care they need. This includes Maryland's self-directed services and in the manner the program was intended—person-centered.

Traditionally, individuals with developmental disabilities have limited agency and control over their lives. Self-directed services offer these individuals independence and autonomy. A participant with the self-directed waiver can choose their daily schedule, decide how to spend their budget, and hire medical assistance, if needed. These are just a few aspects of a self-directed participant that allows them to have decision-making authority in their lives. Self-directed services improve quality of life for so many Marylanders. In recent years, the program has been stripped of its intended objective of being for individualized services, and of its original services, including family members being compensated as staff.

HB318 establishes the State Advisory Council on Self-Directed Services within the Maryland Department of Health (MDH). The council must report on how the self-directed services process is meeting participants' needs and recommendations for improvement. It also allows an option for a participant's family member to be their support broker. Maryland's disability community is expressing exactly what they need, and it is time we provide it.

The MLLC supports this bill and urges a favorable report on HB318.

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
