I am a concerned Marylander and I do not understand why this bill is necessary. Last year Senator Augustine testified that this bill was needed to help pharmacies with generating more revenue, why is this being attempted again? This was not well received among parents like me and it is not well received NOW!! Now this bill is trying to make the age of children even younger - a 3-year-old toddler would be eligible to receive a vaccine in a pharmacy, without a doctor's prescription, according to this bill.

No 3-year-old child should be assessed for vaccine readiness in the middle of a crowded CVS, Walmart or Walgreens Pharmacy and NO Pharmacist should have to stop what they are doing every time a child comes in to get a vaccine. Pharmacists should focus solely on answering prescription questions, filling prescriptions, and making sure their technicians are well supported. Children have a complicated immunization schedule that requires a trained professional (pediatrician or primary care doctor) to assess appropriateness and readiness.
