I am writing today to express my deep, deep disappointment and, frankly, disgust with the draft redistricting map put forward by the baldly partisan Maryland General Assembly's Legislative Redistricting Advisory Commission. Unfortunately, but unsurprisingly, those in power in Annapolis seem unable to stop themselves from seeing this moment as nothing more than yet another opportunity to consolidate even more power to themselves.
