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### Testimony in Support of HB39 - Action for Change of Name - Waiver of Publication Requirement

Chairman Clippinger, Vice-Chair Atterbeary and Members of the Judiciary Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify today in support of HB39. This bill is identical to a bill that was passed unanimously through the Judiciary committee and the House of Delegates in the 2020 session.

This bill will help simplify and update the name-change procedures for those who are currently required to go through our courts by removing the publication requirements for those who file a motion to do so. HB39 would remove the requirement to publish their name change in a local, widely circulated newspaper.

There are several groups that would be positively impacted by the removal of the publication requirement. There could be devastating and dangerous results for victims of domestic violence who are seeking to change their name as part of the process of separating from an abuser. Similarly, individuals who are transgender and are seeking to be identified by their preferred name face unnecessary barriers, and possible violence, from the requirement to out themselves via newspaper publication. In either of these scenarios, not only is this requirement unnecessarily costly at up to \$250 per publication, but this information will also remain forever available to anyone who wishes to find this information on the internet.

Attached you will find a state-by-state analysis, compiled in 2019 when I introduced a similar version of this bill by our legislative library, of name-change policies and the publication requirements. Seventeen states have removed the requirement to publish a name change via newspaper. States including Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas, DC, Virginia, and Connecticut have all removed the publication requirement.

The publication requirement is a holdover rule that was created when creditors required such notice to ensure that debtors did not abscond from their debts. Because credit follows an individual's social security number and not your name, this requirement is no longer necessary.

Changing an individual's name is a personal decision that should not be subject to unnecessary added barriers, particularly ones that could result in harm to the individual. Attached you will find a letter of support, which numerous advocates and organizations have signed in support of HB39.

I urge the committee to report favorably HB39.

Chair Clippinger, Vice-Chair Atterbeary and Members of the Judiciary Committee,

The undersigned individuals and organizations respectfully submit this letter of support for HB39 - Action for Change of Name - Waiver of Publication Requirement, sponsored by Delegate Shetty. This bill would help to simplify and update the name-change procedures for those who are currently required to go through the courts by removing the publication requirements for those who file a motion to do so. HB39 would remove the requirement to publish their name change in a local, widely circulated newspaper.

There are several groups that would be positively impacted by the removal of the publication requirement. There could be devastating and dangerous results for victims of domestic violence who are seeking to change their name as part of the process of separating from their abuser. Similarly, individuals who are transgender and are seeking to be identified by their preferred name face unnecessary barriers from the requirement to publish their name in a newspaper. Newspaper publication is particularly damaging because it is often simultaneously put online, attaching a person's former name to their current name forever. Transgender people are also disproportionately likely to be victims of domestic violence, as well. In either of these scenarios this requirement is unnecessarily costly at approximately \$90 per publication.

Seventeen states, plus Washington D.C. and Puerto Rico have already eliminated the publication requirement. States including Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas, Virginia, and Connecticut have all removed their publication requirement.

The publication requirement is a rule that was established when creditors required a name-change notice to ensure that debtors did not evade their debts. However, because credit follows an individual's social security number and not their name, this requirement is no longer necessary.

Changing an individual's name is a personal decision that should not be subject to unnecessary barriers, particularly ones that can put the individual at a greater risk for harm.
