Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee,

Thank you for allowing testimony today in support of HB0151. Voices Maryland is a grassroots organization focused on State and County level legislation and policies that impacts marginalized communities and veterans affairs. Police accountability legislation is of massive importance to these communities particularly due to how impacted these communities have been historically and currently.

## The key issues with LEOBR:

Here are some of the other problems with the law:

- Conflict of interest investigations with one exception Governor can intervene then Attorney General.
- Inconsistencies in LEOBR when civilian review boards attempted to be created in Frederick in 2000
- LEOBR is extra rights that's why it's called a Bill of rights for law enforcement. It is extra privileges that ordinary citizens do not enjoy who get questioned by police, nor by ordinary employees whom their employers suspect of misconduct.
- LEOBR's red tape harms the accuracy of investigations, too.
- Under LEOBR, the chief of the department cannot order suspension or dismissal until

after a hearing board does its work, reversing the arrangement often found elsewhere..

• The law hides information.

To protect Black, Veteran, and Marginalized citizens we need to repeal LEOBR and consider other options to address these issues.
