Primary and Secondary Education – Expansion of Mental Health Services and Prohibition of School Resource Officers (Police–Free Schools Act)

As a Retired Army Recruiter, I experienced first-hand the benefits of having SRO's in the building. These fine men and women are trained to deescalate situations, separate the parties involved, and preserve any evidence they may be involved. I don't see how removing an asset from the school community benefits anyone.

In the current "cancel" culture and "defund the Police" movements, we must not become so politically correct that we are complacent in putting our kids lives at risk. There are kids that attend school who would prefer not to be there. Their goal in life is to disrupt classrooms, bully other students, and distract others from learning. Many sell drugs at school.
