<u>Oppose</u> Bill 1089 -Primary and Secondary Education – Expansion of Mental Health Services and Prohibition of School Resource Officers (Police–Free Schools Act) —

- 2. A recent survey in Prince Georges County revealed that 82% of respondents described the importance of SROs as "very important." In addition, 92% who had interacted with SROs described their experience as a positive one.
- 3. The reason given in the bill for eliminating SROs is that there is a disparity between black/ Latino and white student arrests, and that incarceration was more likely of black students compared to white. A "heavy hand" is described in the bill as being used by police officers. Since when is breaking the law supposed to be overlooked? Our country and our county are run by law and order. Without enforcing the law, there is a likelihood of disrespect for the law. Even if there is a disparity between people of various skin colors, the law must be enforced to keep learning in our school buildings safe. If you eliminate SROs, you open up an environment of lawlessness and inconsistency in disciplinary action when incidents occur.
- 4. The cost of the SRO program, \$3 million is a small price to pay to provide protection for the children and staff at MCPS.

Please keep our students safe and keep the SRO program intact. How quickly we forget the shooting in 2012 that occurred in Sandy Hook Elementary School in Connecticut, where 28 students and teachers were killed, among other shooting incidents nation-wide.
