A RESOLUTION ENTITLED

A RESOLUTION concerning

PROPERTY TAX MODERNIZATION

FOR the purpose of expressing support for the Henry George Foundation tax reform recommendations and urging the state legislature to permit local property tax modernization, by permitting local governing bodies to adopt separate tax rates for land and improvements.

WHEREAS, The City has the highest property tax rate in the entire State of Maryland; at \$5.90, the City's rate is more than double that of any other subdivision; and

WHEREAS, High property taxes act as a significant deterrent to housing construction and housing rehabilitation, penalizing those who invest in the City's future and those who maintain and improve their property; and

WHEREAS, The City contains thousands of vacant lots and abandoned buildings that offer neither jobs nor housing to the community and which place an added burden on City agencies, as well as having a blighting influence on neighborhoods; and

WHEREAS, It has been shown that for every dollar in property tax revenue collected by the City, 72 cents is taken from housing and other structures while only 28 cents comes from land; and

WHEREAS, The actions of real estate speculators and irresponsible landlords often lead to substandard and deteriorated housing which enjoys a lower tax liability; and

WHEREAS, The City must act to expand its tax base and reduce the tax burden on responsible property owners in order to prevent flight from the City and to attract home buyers and employers; and

WHEREAS, The Henry George Foundation of America has issued a report entitled: <u>Property Tax Reform and Urban Revitalization: A Cause and Effect Plan for Baltimore</u>, which recommends a plan for

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modernizing the property tax system by placing greater emphasis on taxing land values and exempting, in whole or in part, buildings or structures from the property tax; and

WHEREAS, The thrust of this plan is to encourage property owners to build on and improve their properties without the fear of incurring a higher property tax bill; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the City of Baltimore supports the recommendations of the Henry George Foundation Report and urges the Maryland State Legislature to amend the Annotated Code of Maryland to permit the City of Baltimore to modernize its property tax system and differentiate the tax rate placed on land from that placed on buildings and improvements; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Governor, the President of the Maryland State Senate, the Speaker of the House of Delegates and the members of the City Legislative Delegation.

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
