**Baltimore City - Cigarettes, Other Tobacco Products, and Electronic Smoking Devices -
Local Law Authorization**

Mister Chairman and Members of the Committee:

Every jurisdiction has varying demographics with unique challenges. We should allow those who are the most informed about their constituents to make decisions regarding laws that affect them. Local laws are targeted and focused on the most pressing needs of the people.

The General Assembly has a responsibility to act to preserve public health and safety and must do so now. Specifically with regards to tobacco and smoking. "Tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable disease and death in the United States, and nearly all tobacco use being during youth and young adulthood," a report from the CDC declared.

The federal government took unprecedented and swift action to raise the minimum age to purchase tobacco to 21 in 2019. While a necessary and exemplary measure, we can and must do more to ensure we mitigate the ongoing rise in tobacco use, specifically among young people.

House Bill 442 would authorize a county or municipality to enact and enforce local laws, that are at least as stringent as state laws, regarding the regulation of the sale and distribution of cigarettes, other tobacco products, and electronic smoking devices. HB1011 explicitly does not give local jurisdictions authority over the issuance of licenses or imposition of taxes regarding tobacco products and electronic smoking devices.

This legislation strikes an appropriate regulatory balance. I urge the Committee to act favorably on House Bill 442.
