To Whom It May Concern,

My name is Cory McCagh, my family owns and operates 1812 Brewery in Cumberland. A few years ago, the General Assembly passed a bill to create a Class L license, modeled after other states' rules that allow a local brewery, winery or distillery to offer samples and sales (by the glass/pint) of other locally-produced alcohol products.

Once implemented, we immediately applied for the license from the Allegany Board of Licensed Commissioners. Our goal was to offer our neighbor's products for sampling as a way to cross-promote other local businesses and accommodate customers who may not love our beer but still want to support local. Other local manufacturers have also obtained this license and we appreciate their support of our products.

Traveling customers are always asking about where they should go next while in town. Since we obtained the Class L license and have offerings from other local businesses, we're frequently asked about visiting those establishment's. Rather than heading out of town, they often will add an extra stop or plan out their next trip around hitting all of the local craft spots. It's helped us create more of an inclusive community for all craft beverage drinkers.

Since the precedent for this license has been set in Pennsylvania and Delaware—and in our own state—it's only appropriate to allow other breweries, wineries, distilleries, cideries and meaderies the same ability to promote neighboring businesses, increase visitors and grow their tax base. This doesn't take away from other businesses, it actually increases traffic into our area which, in turn, supports other local establishments.

SUPPORT SB 351 Worcester County- Alcoholic Beverages- Class L License

On behalf of the Worcester County Commissioners and the Office of Tourism and Economic Development, I respectfully request your support of SB 351, which would establish a Class L beer, wine and liquor license in Worcester County; authorizing the Board of License Commissioners to issue the license to a holder of a manufacturer's license; specifying that the license authorizes the license holder to sell or provide samples of certain beer, wine, and liquor for on-premises consumption under certain circumstances; providing the hours of sale are the same as those for the underlying manufacturer's license; and establishing an annual license fee of \$250.

This bill would immensely benefit our small rural alcohol manufacturers and is whole heartedly supported by our county commissioners, county administration and our local manufacturers. This is one of a number of efforts to propel the Agritourism industry in Worcester County which has become extremely popular, especially since the pandemic, allowing local on-farm producers and local manufacturers to diversify their offerings and create new revenue streams. The manufacturer would still need to apply for the license through the Worcester Liquor Control Board, thus ensuring a check and balance system locally. The business would then carry the Class L with their Maryland state manufacturing license.

This license, if issued, would allow the business to offer other Maryland made manufacturers products along with their own. Under current state-issued manufacturing licenses, they cannot offer any products other than their own. So currently, a local craft brewery cannot offer to serve or sample Maryland-made wine, mead, cider or spirits or even another craft beer. For our existing on farm manufacturers, this would alleviate the pressure of having to solely respond to current demands of the customers. The ability to offer other Maryland-made products to those guests that may not have typically been exposed to such offerings expands the business's appeal, thus attracting more diverse visitors and patrons. It is also an opportunity to attract guests from other states to experience various Maryland-made products in one setting, noting that all products must be consumed on site so this doesn't compete with a retail operation. For example, it would give Windmill Creek Winery in Berlin additional Maryland wines to offer guests while easing production issues with the current grape shortage. In addition, if an event such as a wedding is held on premises, the business currently cannot allow any other product other than what they produce at the event (e.g. for a winery, there is no ability to provide Maryland-made beer, cider or spirits without a Class L, thus limiting the selection for the guests). Class L license would also enable a farm brewery like Sinepuxent Brewing the ability to offer a guest beer tap from another Maryland brewery, and alleviate the heavy cost of expansion during a difficult supply chain crisis.

With the county's goal of growing agricultural tourism, I believe this will help tremendously by allowing Worcester County to issue a Class L license. Therefore, I respectfully request a favorable report for SB 351.

Thank you Chair Pinsky, Vice Chair Kagan, and members of the Senate Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee for the opportunity to respectfully ask for your support of **Senate Bill 351 Worcester County - Alcoholic Beverages - Class L License.** This legislation has been requested by the Worcester County Commissioners and the Worcester County Office of Tourism.

This bill establishes the Class L beer, wine, and liquor (BWL) license in Worcester County and authorizes the Worcester County Board of License Commissioners to issue the license to the holder of a manufacturer's license. The license authorizes the holder, for on-premises consumption, to sell only Maryland made beer, wine, and liquor produced by the holder or another holder of a manufacturer's license, and provide a sample of the beer, wine or liquor at no cost.

SB 351 would allow existing small breweries, wineries and distilleries to offer only Maryland made products. This diversity of Maryland products could be especially helpful to businesses like Windmill Creek as they experience a grape shortage affecting their own production.

It's important to note that the Maryland General Assembly approved a Class L license to Alleghany County in 2019. This is settled law, not a new request. The experience in Alleghany County has been a positive one without adverse impacts to other local businesses. SB 351 simply would allow this same opportunity to Worcester County as a couple of local holders of manufacturer's licenses have expressed an interest in applying for the Class L license.

I respectfully request a favorable report on SB 351, a priority local bill that would give a limited number of small businesses more options in offering Maryland products on their own premises.

RE: **OPPOSE** – Senate Bill 351 – Worcester County – Alcoholic Beverages – Class L License

The Maryland State Licensed Beverage Association (MSLBA), which consists of approximately 1,000 Maryland businesses holding alcoholic beverage licenses (restaurants, bars, taverns, and package stores), **opposes** Senate Bill 351.

This legislation would establish a Class L license that can be obtained by any manufacturer (brewery, winery, or distillery), and would allow the manufacturer to sell beer, wine, and liquor and to offer free samples of it. This privilege essentially turns every brewery, winery, and distillery into a bar.

Maryland has a longstanding policy of allowing manufacturers to sell only products which they manufacture at their location. This bill and other alcohol bills before the Committee will change this policy by allowing manufacturers either to sell ALL alcohol products made by anyone or allow them to sell alcohol products made by any Maryland manufacturer. Manufacturers should not be bars under the three-tier system, but that is exactly what these bills or the proposed amendments permit to happen.

Every year now for the better part of the last 15 years, the State's manufacturers have introduced bills that erode the three-tier system of alcohol distribution, under which manufacturers were prohibited from selling alcoholic beverages to customers at all. The erosion began with the offering of small samples of their own products on guided tours but continued with efforts to sell larger and larger amounts. These efforts were presented as a way for the manufacturers to better market their own products. But the biggest change came several years ago when the brewers obtained authority from the Legislature to operate tap rooms. MSLBA resisted this change because we knew what the next step was – manufacturers selling not just their own products but all alcoholic beverages, just like a bar. This legislation represents the predicted next step. This is no longer about marketing their own products, but about being a general retailer of all alcoholic beverages.

MSLBA urges the Committee to reject this legislation. If our distribution system is to have any integrity left at all, this change should not be permitted.
