I am strongly in support of this powerful and strategic bill that would allow this Constitutional amendment to be added on to future ballot referendums.

Since the Industrial Revolution began with the discovery of coal in Wales, I would submit that governments and many elected officials have not put our environmental ecosystem's sustainability and its importance as the life sustaining system, at the forefront, or often in any way, of critical decisions made with our shared natural resources.

It seems odd in a way to have to legislate a bill that must be passed to be included on a ballot agreeing that our environment is a human right.
