Re: Letter of Information - Senate Bill 302 – Legionnaires’ Disease Prevention Act

Dear Chair Pinsky:

On behalf of the Maryland Hospital Association’s (MHA) 60 member hospitals and health systems, we appreciate the opportunity to comment on Senate Bill 302. Dedicated caregivers at Maryland’s nonprofit hospitals and health systems care for millions of people each year, and we appreciate your efforts to maintain their health through thoughtful regulation of the environments in which they live and work.

Maryland hospitals are held to strict standards by The Joint Commission, the nation’s oldest and largest standards-setting and accrediting body in health care. Hospitals must follow rigorous standards to obtain accreditation, including water management plans specifically addressing Legionella and other waterborne pathogens. These standards were updated as recently as January 2021 and considers both the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating, and Air-Conditioning Engineers Standard 188 (Legionellosis: Risk Management for Building Water Systems) and the CDC toolkit.^{1,2}
