

# Support HB 1291

This bill ensures appropriate separation of powers: healthcare and education. The schools should not be mandating healthcare decisions to their subjects, and all such decisions have to go through the Department of Health first.

We all have enough recent experience with being subjected to the policies school systems have established on their own. After two years it is hard to observe much success from those policies - a large percentage of children and staff get infected. Worse yet, the policies keep changing arbitrarily based on unverified metrics that are hard to track. No wonder CDC no longer recommends universal case investigation and contact tracing.

As COVID vaccination does not prevent transmission or infection and targets an obsolete variant, there is no good reason to universally require or promote the vaccines. The decision whether to take any vaccine must be a private, voluntary decision between healthcare providers and patients based on the individual risk/benefit profile of each patient, not on government incentives. Collecting and using this information in a broadly available system abolishes any medical privacy one could hope for.

Such unequal treatment has caused hardship to some families and undoubtedly contributed to increases in mental health issues. There should not be any reason to segregate population based on medical or genetic information.
