Ambar Francis Position: Favorable Testimony for House Bill 0565

Good morning Chairman and Health and Government Operations Committee

My name is Ambar Francis, a student at the University of Maryland, College Park. I am here today to ask you to vote favorably for house bill 565: Indigenous Peoples' Day – Rule of Interpretation and Replacement of Columbus Day.
