## Senate Bill 150

March 30, 2022 Position: **Favorable** 

Chairman, and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to advocate for access to health care in our State. I am Lee Hudson, assistant to the bishop for public policy in the Delaware-Maryland Synod, <u>E</u>vangelical <u>L</u>utheran <u>C</u>hurch in <u>A</u>merica; a faith community with three synods, in every part of Maryland.

In a 2003 national assembly our community committed to advocate that all people living in the United States of America, Puerto Rico, and U.S. territories have equitable access to a basic level of preventive, acute, and chronic physical and mental health care.

**Senate Bill 150** will place Maryland in the column of states that include dental coverage in their Medical Assistance programs.

Maryland has done much to expand access to health care with good results for its citizens. This Committee has done its share of that work. We thank you.

Dental care is necessary for good health. We humans are more than a collection of body parts and functions. We are an integrated whole. The condition of the region of the mouth needs care and intervention as much as any other anatomical element. Poor dental health is implicated in other illnesses and conditions.

Including dental care in Medicaid will help reduce disparity in health outcomes. Those whom this bill would cover are un-or under-insured. We note with concern that disparity of health outcomes occurs with a racial bias. Improving access to appropriate and needed care is also the best way to manage health cost, for consumers and the State.

For these reasons we urge a favorable report.
