SB 355 – Criminal Law – HIV Prevention Drugs - Prescribing and Dispensing by
Pharmacists and Insurance Requirements
House Health and Government Operations Committee
March 24, 2022

Health Care for the Homeless strongly supports SB 355. This bill reduces the barriers to people accessing post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) and pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) to prevent HIV infection. For people enrolled in Medicaid or with commercial insurance, the removal of prior authorization requirements means a much greater chance someone will access the medication in a timely manner. This is especially important for PEP which must be initiated within 72 hours of exposure to be effective.

The federal government has recommended for almost two decades the use of PEP to prevent the transmission of HIV to infants at child birth, to people who engage in unprotected sex with an anonymous partner, and to people who share syringes. It is also a necessary medication to victims of sexual assault and sex workers who are unknowingly or unintentionally exposed.

In addition, SB 355 will provide clarity regarding the prohibition on public and private insurance on establishing cost-sharing on PrEP related ancillary services. These services go hand in hand with the use of PrEP and must not be difficult to for people to access. When used appropriately, PrEP can reduce the risk of contracting HIV by 99%.

Access to PrEP is a huge health equity issue given the massive racial disparities in new infections and utilization of PrEP. Clients at Health Care for the Homeless can find waiting for authorization a barrier that results in poor health outcomes. We also believe the limitations and requirements in the bill on pharmacists and their ability to prescribe and dispense these life-saving drugs are appropriate and do not put people at risk.

For these reasons, we urge the committee to give SB 355 a favorable report.
