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SB133 - State Board for Certification of Residential Child Care Program Professionals – Certification – Membership and Official Seal

Testimony of Senator Mary Washington

March 24, 2022

Chair Pendergrass, Vice Chair Pena-Melnyk, and Members of the Health and Government Operations Committee,

SB133 will amend the number of Board members on the State Board for the Certification of Residential Child Care Program Professionals from 12 to 11.

This change will allow the Board to have an odd number of voting members, thereby making it easier to achieve a majority of votes on significant legislative and administrative matters that impact the quality of services provided to the youth being served, without State agencies' conflict of interest.

The current even number of Board members make voting problematic, especially when those members who work for other State agencies frequently abstain from voting, making it difficult to obtain a majority.

The State Board for the Certification of Residential Child Care Program Professionals currently consists of 12 members. Six of those members are appointed by different secretaries of several state agencies involved in the licensing and monitoring of residential childcare programs. These agencies are the Department of Health/Behavioral Health Administration and Developmental Disabilities Administration, Department of Human Services, Department of Juvenile Services, Maryland Department of Education, and the State Subcabinet member.

The remaining six members are appointed by the Governor. Three are Residential Child Care Program Administrators (RCCPA), one is a Residential Child and Youth Care Professional (RCYCP) and two are consumers. **SB 133 will remove the subcabinet**

member, assigned to the Department of Disabilities, an agency that does not provide licensing and monitoring of residential children services. The removal of this member will allow for the board to achieve majority votes on vital matters that significantly impact services provided to youth served without interference.

This legislation will also eliminate the requirement for Residential Child and Youth Care Professional (RCYCP) to adopt an official seal.

This change will make the Board as effective and efficient in their work as possible. The Residential Child Care Program Professionals have requested this change to be able to make decisions more effectively and continue on with their important work to ensure that Maryland's children receive high quality care in residential child care programs.

I respectfully request a favorable report on SB 133.
