## American Kennel Club Testimony on SB 38 - Public Safety – Fire and Rescue – Veterinary Care of Retired Fire and Rescue K–9s

The American Kennel Club (AKC) provides this written testimony in support of SB 38. By way of introduction, the AKC is the world's largest purebred dog registry. We are a club of more than 5,000 local and breed dog clubs around the country, including 78 clubs in Maryland. Our affiliated clubs maintain America's largest purebred rescue network, and for over 135 years AKC has been proud to be the only non-profit purebred registry devoted to the health and well-being of all dogs.

Existing Chapter 90 of 2021 requires a State or local law enforcement agency that removes a publicly owned dog used in law enforcement work from duty to reimburse an individual who, under a written agreement with the law enforcement agency, takes possession of the dog for reasonable and necessary veterinary treatment provided to the dog. This bill would extend the requirement to a State or local fire and rescue entity that removes from duty a dog used in fire and rescue work.

Like our law enforcement dogs, dogs used in fire and rescue work should be afforded the same gratitude. Oftentimes, these working dogs provide services that cannot readily be performed by humans. When the time comes that they can no longer perform the important service for which they have been trained, they deserve to retire into loving homes. Unfortunately, the cost of veterinary care could be a deterrent for some families that would love to adopt these dogs, including their professional handlers, who often wish to adopt the dog they have worked so close with for many years.

Given the work requirements and conditions these dog work under, they may be more likely require veterinary care in retirement than their companion animal counterparts. Much like the legislation passed last year for law enforcement dogs, this legislation would ensure that retired fire and rescue dogs do not fail to receive veterinary care because of financial barriers faced by their owners. To help offset the cost, this bill also allows individuals to make contributions to the K-9 Compassionate Care Fund that was established in Chapter 90 last year.

Again, AKC supports this bill and believes working dogs and those who would adopt them upon retirement deserve the support this bill would provide. As such, we urge a favorable report on SB 38.

The Humane Society of the United States supports SB38, which expands the Compassion Care Fund established last year to include fire and rescue agencies.

Chairman Smith, Vice Chairman Waldstreicher, members of the Judicial Proceedings Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify before to you today. My name is Lisa Radov. I am the President and Chairman of Maryland Votes for Animals. We champion humane legislation to improve the lives of animals in Maryland. Speaking for Maryland Votes for Animals, our Board of Directors, and our members across Maryland, I respectfully request that the Judicial Proceedings Committee vote favorably for Public Safety- Fire and Rescue- Veterinary Care of Retired Fire and Rescue K -9's- SB 38.

This bill requires that State or local fire and rescue entities to reimburse individuals who take possession of dogs formerly used in fire and rescue work under a written agreement for reasonable and necessary veterinary treatment not to exceed \$2,500 per year. It also permits State fire and rescue entities to accept certain donations and requiring that the donations be disbursed to that fund as well as authorizing local fire and rescue entities to establish a separate fund to accept public donations for the payment of certain veterinary expenses.

Senator Kramer's 2021 bill, SB 156 Public Safety - Law Enforcement - Veterinary Care of Retired Law Enforcement K-9s Acts, required certain State and local law enforcement agencies to reimburse people who adopt retired law enforcement dogs for veterinary expenses and established The Compassionate Care Fund. That bill passed unanimously in the Senate 45-0 and in the House 134-0. This bill, Public Safety- Fire and Rescue- Veterinary Care of Retired Fire and Rescue K-9's -SB 38 expands the categories of dogs covered by the bill to include dogs used in fire and rescue operations.

Fire and rescue dogs are employed during some of the most dangerous emergency situations, from house fires to natural disasters, explosions, and more. Therefore, the injuries that these brave and highly trained dogs might sustain could not only be life- threatening, but if they are fortunate enough to survive, might require significant veterinary expenses years after the injury. This bill would help to cover those costs for families who are willing to take in a dog who has paid its debt to society. In addition, extending the ability of fire and rescue organizations to accept donations to for The Compassionate Care Fund would further support veterinary care that these dogs receive.

This bill is a win- win. It is a win for the caring person or family who adopts a fire or rescue dog and a win for that dog who gets to live out its golden years in a loving home with support for veterinary care after sacrificing so much to serve our greater community.

In closing, I would like to thank Senator Kramer for sponsoring SB 38 and urge a favorable report.
