Testimony Supporting House Bill 110

The Maryland Coalition Against Sexual Assault (MCASA) is a non-profit membership organization that includes the State's seventeen rape crisis centers, law enforcement, mental health and health care providers, attorneys, educators, survivors of sexual violence and other concerned individuals. MCASA includes the Sexual Assault Legal Institute (SALI), a statewide legal services provider for survivors of sexual assault. MCASA represents the unified voice and combined energy of all of its members working to eliminate sexual violence. We urge the Judiciary Committee to report favorably on House Bill 110.

House Bill 110 – Stalking

Increased Penalties for Serial Stalking or Stalking in Violation of a Protective Order

House Bill 110 would increase the penalties for stalkers convicted of stalking or who commit stalking in while a protective order for the same victim was in place.

Stalking of the victim by the offender is a frequent precursor of the sexual assault.

Stalking is also common. About 1 in 6 women and 1 in 17 men have experienced stalking in their lifetimes. Stalking is quite serious and impacts the physical and mental health of victims. Research shows stalking can lead to depression and post-traumatic stress disorder. About 68% of female and 70% of male victims experienced threats of physical harm during their lifetime.

Stalkers who are stalking in violation of a protective order or who have committed stalking in the past are clearly dangerous. Permitting courts to impose a longer sentence in these cases recognizes the danger they pose and can help prevent future violence.
