

This bill would allow camera surveillance footage to be viewed only when a possible issue is brought to the attention of school administration. The video will not be used to monitor teacher instruction or for student behavior/placement. It is not intended as a 'gotcha' for teachers and may in fact be used to counter false allegations of abuse.

We are in support of House Bill 226 to allow cameras in self-contained special education classrooms in Maryland. Our society is under constant surveillance these days, and yet our most vulnerable children do not have that same protection while in school. Imagine what it feels like to have your non-verbal child come home from school with bumps, bruises or scratches but no explanation from the school staff. To see your child suddenly resist going to school but they cannot explain why. 
