The Maryland Association of Counties (MACo) **SUPPORTS** SB 368. This bill would authorize local governments that participate in the Law Enforcement Officers' Pension System (LEOPS) to permit paid emergency medical technicians (EMTs) to enroll in the LEOPS program.

Emergency medical services in Maryland are rooted in the skills and commitment of county first responders, including EMTs. Counties would appreciate the option to offer EMTs enhanced disability and retirement benefits through the LEOPS program. MACo prefers the approach offered by SB 368, as it provides local autonomy to determine the best way to provide these incentives, rather than those that mandate reductions in local revenue sources.

Counties and municipalities in Maryland are eligible to participate in LEOPS. If 60% of the law enforcement officers or paid firefighters (including paid paramedics) in an eligible governmental unit petition to become members of LEOPS, the legislative body of the eligible local government may approve their participation.

This bill would ensure that local governments have appropriate flexibility in enacting local policies designed to serve and react to community needs.

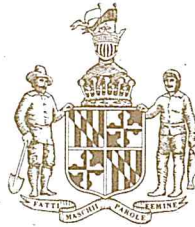
Accordingly, MACo urges the Committee to issue a **FAVORABLE** report on SB 368.

TESTIMONY – SENATE BILL 368
LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS' PENSION SYSTEM –

Fellow Committee Members:

Senate Bill 368 is a very straightforward piece of legislation that that simply adds paid Emergency Medical Technicians to LEOPS (the Law Enforcement Officers' Pension System).

As someone who spent the majority of his professional career in the public safety arena, the retention and recruitment of quality public servants in this field is an issue that is critically important to me. The changes proposed in this legislation would be a means to that end and a solid step to improve both recruitment and retention efforts for agencies housing Emergency Medical Technicians statewide.

This bill is a modest effort to help level the benefit playing field for these public servants and to provide participating state agencies a tool to compete for the services of these individuals with both competing neighboring agencies and the private sector.

For the reasons listed above, I ask for a favorable report of Senate Bill 368.
