RE: SUPPORT – Senate Bill 148 – Victim Services Programs – Supplementing Federal Funding and

Support (Victim Services Stabilization Act)

The Maryland Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics (MDAAP) is a statewide association representing more than 1,100 pediatricians and allied pediatric and adolescent healthcare practitioners in the State and is a strong and established advocate promoting the health and safety of all the children we serve. On behalf of MDAAP, we submit this letter of **support** for Senate Bill 148.

The *Victims of Crimes Act* (VOCA) provides funding to states to support victim service programs. VOCA funds in Maryland are managed through the Governor's Office of Crime Prevention, Youth, and Victim Services (GOCPYV), which uses VOCA funds to award grants to victim service organizations throughout the state. VOCA grants provide coverage for essential services, such as forensic interviews and medical evaluations, family advocacy, and mental health treatment, which are critical in meeting the needs of maltreated children and their families.

Senate Bill 148 would stabilize funding for victim service programs by using state funds to supplement fluctuations in federal VOCA funding. VOCA funding has fluctuated dramatically from year to year despite the fact that the number of Maryland children with suspected maltreatment, and therefore the need for services, has remained consistently high. Lack of consistent funding makes it difficult, if not impossible, to sustain victim services for maltreated children. Failure to provide these needed services increases the likelihood of revictimization and ongoing physical and mental health needs. Passage of Senate Bill 148 will prevent the fluctuation in funding for victim services, thereby enabling the State to consistently provide services to children who have been victimized. A favorable report is requested.
