RE: Senate Bill 822 – <u>FAVORABLE</u> – Pathways in Technology Early College High (P-TECH) School Program – High School Diplomas

Dear Chair Feldman and Members of the Committee:

The Maryland Transportation Builders and Materials Association (MTBMA) has been and continues to serve as the voice for Maryland's construction transportation industry since 1932. Our association is comprised of 200 members. MTBMA encourages, develops, and protects the prestige of the transportation construction and materials industry in Maryland by establishing and maintaining respected relationships with federal, state, and local public officials. We proactively work with regulatory agencies and governing bodies to represent the interests of the transportation industry and advocate for adequate state and federal funding for Maryland's multimodal transportation system.

Senate Bill 822 requires that each student within the Pathways in Technology Early College High School Program (P-TECH) receive a high school diploma from the county board immediately following completion of all high school graduation requirements, regardless of whether the student has completed the pathway sequence.

The P-TECH program is a great asset to our State. MTMBA supports any adjustments to the program that make it easier for students to succeed. The P-TECH program ensures students who chose the route of a career in trade will have a mentor in the industry and a paid internship. This puts them on a path to success right out of high school. These alternative pathways to college result in high-paying, high quality stable careers. We are experiencing a nationwide labor shortage and anything that can be done to encourage this path is necessary. The transportation industry would benefit greatly from the influx of a younger, highly trained workforce, and so we support this initiative.

We appreciate you taking the time to address this issue and we respectfully urge a favorable report on Senate Bill 822.
